

### Minnesota's workers' compensation COVID-19 claims update

Claims reported through Dec. 25, 2021

#### Workers' compensation COVID-19 presumption

#### CHAPTER 72--H.F.No. 4537

An act relating to workers' compensation; providing a presumption for COVID-19 workers' compensation claims for certain employees; requiring a report; authorizing extension of the implementation date of the CAMPUS system; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 176.011, subdivision 15.

The presumption covers:

- a licensed peace officer, firefighter, paramedic or emergency medical technician;
- certain workers employed at a corrections, detention or secure treatment facility;
- a health care provider, nurse or assistive employee employed in a health care, home care or longterm care setting, with direct COVID-19 patient care or ancillary work in COVID-19 patient units; and
- a person required to provide child care to children of first responders and health care workers under Executive Orders 20-02 and 20-19.

It is effective for workers contracting COVID-19 on or after April 8, 2020, through Dec. 31, 2021.

Approximately 183,000 workers are eligible for presumption coverage (estimated in March 2020).




#### About these claim counts

- The claims counts show the total number of claims with COVID-19 or coronavirus exposure given as a nature or cause of injury.
- All claims submitted are included in the count of reported claims, ignoring lost-time status and acceptance or denial of benefits.
- Injury reports are received at three to four weeks, on average, after the date of illness.
  - The illness date is either reported by the worker or employer. It does not always correspond with the date of onset of symptoms.
  - Primary liability decisions generally arrive a week or two after the claim is reported.
  - The Department of Labor and Industry (DLI) continues to receive claims with illness dates six months earlier.




#### 28,319 COVID-19 claims reported through Dec. 25, 2021; 6,452 claims since Sept. 1, 2021


#### At least 450 claims a week in November, December 2021


#### **Delta surge affecting presumption group claims**

#### Delta surge affecting all worker groups




COVID-19 claims by month received and industry-presumption group



#### **VBT Cases among Health Care Workers**


These data are for all vaccine breakthrough cases who reported their occupation as health care staff in acute care or congregate care facilities. Vaccine breakthrough cases are defined as Minnesota residents with a positive test result (both confirmed and probable) with onset date (or specimen collection date if asymptomatic) 14 or more days post full vaccine series and no positive COVID-19 result in the 90 days prior to their COVID infection.



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#### Non-presumption worker denial rates dropped since June 2021


Denial rate by month reported and presumption status





## **COVID-19 claims are concentrated in industries covered by the presumption of work-relatedness**








#### Half of all claims were from hospitals and nursing homes

Detailed industries\* with 200 or more COVID-19 claims filed as of Dec. 25, 2021



Detailed industries\* with 250 or more COVID-19 accepted or paid indemnity claims as of Dec. 25, 2021





### Detailed industries\* with 50 or more COVID-19 claims with illnesses dated July 1, 2021 or later, reported as of Dec. 25, 2021




#### Almost all first responder claims in recent months have been paid


#### No difference in average work disability duration

Sum of payments reported to date by benefit type and presumption status




- Indemnity benefits cover wage loss and permanent disability.
- Ninety-five percent of benefits were paid to presumption group workers.
- Ninety-one percent of paid benefits have been to cover wage loss from temporary total disability.
- Payments to 14,300

   470 non-presumption
   workers.

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# Highlights of Minnesota findings from multi-bureau study of insured COVID-19 claims (including MWCIA)

- Looked at 4,944 Minnesota COVID-19 claims from 2020
- Twenty-eight percent of claims, 7% of incurred costs
- Thirty-eight percent of COVID-19 claims were indemnity-only, 13% medical-only, 49% indemnity and medical; indemnity-only typically are about 1% of claims
- Average severity (paid plus reserves): Indemnity-only claims \$1,000; indemnity plus medical, \$9,600
- COVID-19 claim payments were 87% lower than for non-COVID-19 claims
- COVID-19 claims closed faster than non-COVID-19 claims; 95% of indemnity-only claims were closed
