

#### Minnesota's workers' compensation COVID-19 claims update Claims reported through Oct. 4, 2021

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### About the workers' compensation COVID-19 presumption

#### CHAPTER 72--H.F.No. 4537

An act relating to workers' compensation; providing a presumption for COVID-19 workers' compensation claims for certain employees; requiring a report; authorizing extension of the implementation date of the CAMPUS system; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 176.011, subdivision 15.

The presumption covers:

- a licensed peace officer, firefighter, paramedic or emergency medical technician;
- certain workers employed at a corrections, detention or secure treatment facility;
- a health care provider, nurse or assistive employee employed in a health care, home care or long-term care setting, with direct COVID-19 patient care or ancillary work in COVID-19 patient units;
- a person required to provide child care to children of first responders and health care workers under Executive Orders 20-02 and 20-19.

Effective for workers contracting COVID-19 on or after April 8, 2020, through Dec. 31, 2021.


Approximately 183,000 workers are eligible for presumption coverage (estimated in March 2020).

#### About these claim counts

- The claims counts show the total number of claims with COVID-19 or coronavirus exposure given as a nature of injury.
- All claims submitted are included in the count of reported claims, ignoring losttime status and acceptance or denial of benefits.
- Injury reports are received at three to four weeks, on average, after the date of illness.
  - The illness date is either reported by the worker or employer. It does not always correspond with the date of onset of symptoms.
  - Primary liability decisions generally arrive a week or two after the claim is reported
  - DLI continues to receive claims with illness dates from much earlier in the pandemic




#### 23,068 claims reported through Oct. 4, 2021






#### Delta surge affecting presumption group claims

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#### Claims from health care establishments – 74%


COVID-19 claims filed by industry-presumption group





### Most industries have reported very few COVID-19 claims


Number of CV-19 claims by industry sector<sup>\*</sup> as of October 4, 2021



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### Many types of health care industry workers are filing claims\*


Number of CV-19 claims by occupation group\* as of October 4, 2021

Denial rate by month reported by presumption status




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#### Presumption status affects claim acceptance


#### Claim status for claims filed after presumption effective



- Ninety-five percent of accepted claims were in the presumption group.
- Non-presumption worker claims were 16% of all claims and 47% of denied claims.


### Non-presumption claims are much more likely to be denied


Denial status for claims filed after presumption effective



- It may take a few weeks for insurers to report on claim acceptance or denial, so we have claims with no decision reported.
- For medical-only claims, we typically do not receive liability reports.

# Among claims with a reported liability decision, the denial rate is five times higher for non-presumption workers









## Presumption status and workplace conditions affect denial rates

Denials as percentage of decisions in each presumption industry/occupation group




- Only 20 child care claims have been reported, so they are not shown as a group.
- Meat processing is shown separately from other nonpresumption claims because they have not been paid.

# \$15.6 million has been paid in indemnity benefits for claims after the presumption became effective


### Sum of payments reported to date by benefit type and presumption status



- Indemnity benefits cover wage loss and permanent disability.
- Ninety-six percent of benefits were paid to presumption group workers.
- Ninety-three percent of paid benefits have been to cover wage loss from temporary total disability.
- Payments to 10,971
   presumption workers and
   290 non-presumption
   workers.
